Pastor’s Letter: A personal Story

This month's letter is more of a personal story. Most you know my wife has suffered from cerebral palsy since she was a baby. It affects her whole right side. She has no use of her left hand and walking can be difficult at times and has led to falls and broken bones over the years. Over the years she has had many surgeries to try and correct or help with related issues. Braces for her leg are a must.



This has led to many challenges for her over the years. She has faced each of them with bravery and a willingness to succeed. When I first met her, one of our first conversations was about whether she needed my help to carry groceries into to her apartment. She told me then, “If I need your help, I'll ask for it.”

However, asking for help is a difficult thing for her. She wants to be able to do it on her own, I mean, after all, that's what's got her through all these years. Graduating with a master's degree, caring for two children, being employed in a variety of settings and even managing to be a pastor's wife and put up with me on the side.

However, the last two years have been especially difficult for her. Issues with her mobility have increased and that has led to several serious falls. Issues with her hand, her good hand, her only hand, has led to the need for surgery in October. Her surgeon has been encouraging her to do this for over a year. In the last few months, there have been noticeable changes to her hand as well as increasing issues related to pain.

We will be going to Union Memorial on October 19th at 10 a.m. for Thumb CMC (Basal Joint) Arthroplasty - Thumb Joint Reconstruction as well as surgery for a Trigger Figure. When the surgery itself has a 97% success rate, to say that Kim is worried is an understatement. When you only have one hand even a 3% chance of something going wrong seems like a great risk. There is the additional reality that some surgeries she has had in the past have not improved anything and have simply led to pain and disappointment.

We ask not only for your prayers during this time but your understanding. Because she will essentially be handless at first, I will be taking at least two and a half weeks off to be home and care for her. The three Sundays I am out will be covered in this manner: October 21st is laity Sunday, October 28th, Debbie Siegert will be preaching, November 4th, Rev Earl Mason will be covering.

During the time I'm off, Rev Earl Mason has graciously agreed to be on call for any emergencies. At this point, Charge Conference is still on October 24th at 7 p.m. at Ames UMC in Belair. I will be asking the district superintendent if I can be excused from attending since this will be early in Kim's recovery. This makes it even more important that we have representation from our leaders and laity of the church.

It is our hope that things will go better than expected and her initial recovery will be quick and as pain free as possible. By November 5, I hope to go back to work without needing to be home with Kim. Kim is hoping that after four to six weeks she will be able to return to work. However, full recovery can be as long as three months. Keep her employment in prayer as well because at this point it is uncertain whether they will hold her job for the time that she needs to be off.

We have already had offers for help and we greatly appreciate that. I would ask that for the first two weeks if you want to reach out and show your support to Kim please make it by a card, a note, an email, a text or on Facebook.

I know that, at first, she won't be up for visitors and most likely it will be awhile before she feels comfortable coming to church. I may need some help getting her to church when she feels up to it since she may not be able to drive.

Thank you for your prayers and your understanding. If you have any questions, feel free to reach out to me.

The Board of Trustees has been very busy over the past few months working on several projects around the church. Here is a list of what we have done and what's next on our "to do" list:

Recently Completed Projects

- Parsonage was completely renovated, lease was signed and the house is now occupied.
- Garage door was replaced on the parsonage.
- The playground was weeded and new playground chips were added bringing the playground up to safety code.
- The siding that had been ripped off during a storm this spring had been replaced.
- Railings were installed on the outside steps by the 2nd floor side door exit.
- The eternal light and the large stained glass picture from Overlea were hung in the sanctuary and narthex. The picture will also have lights installed to provide back lighting to this beautiful piece.
- Repairs were made to the roof and drains were cleaned out to eliminate leaks in the building
- Flowers and palms were planted in pots around the building
